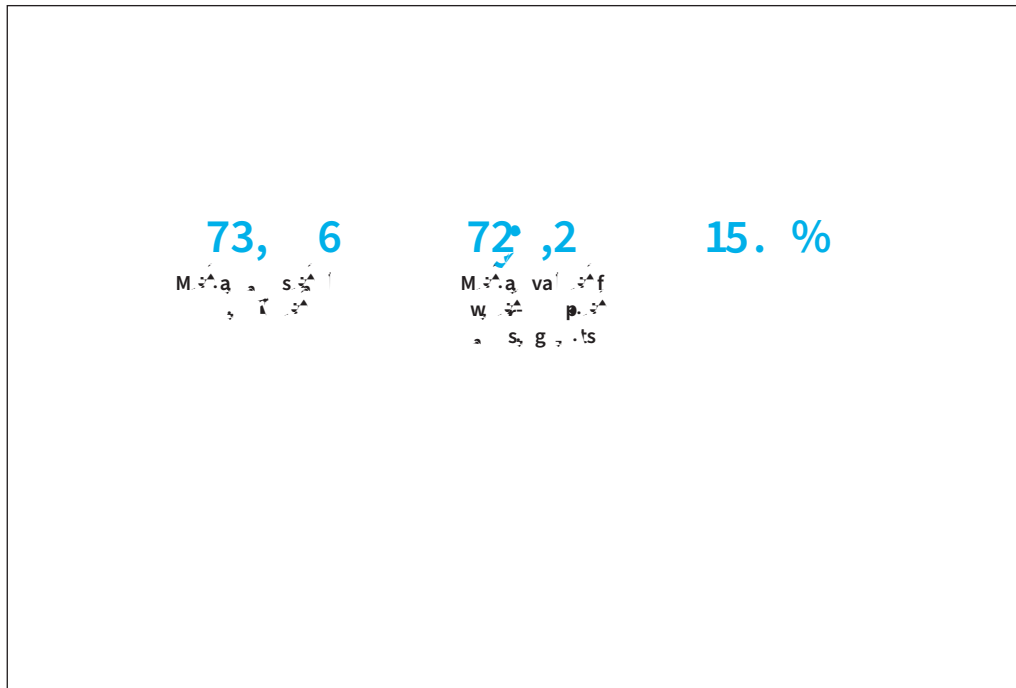


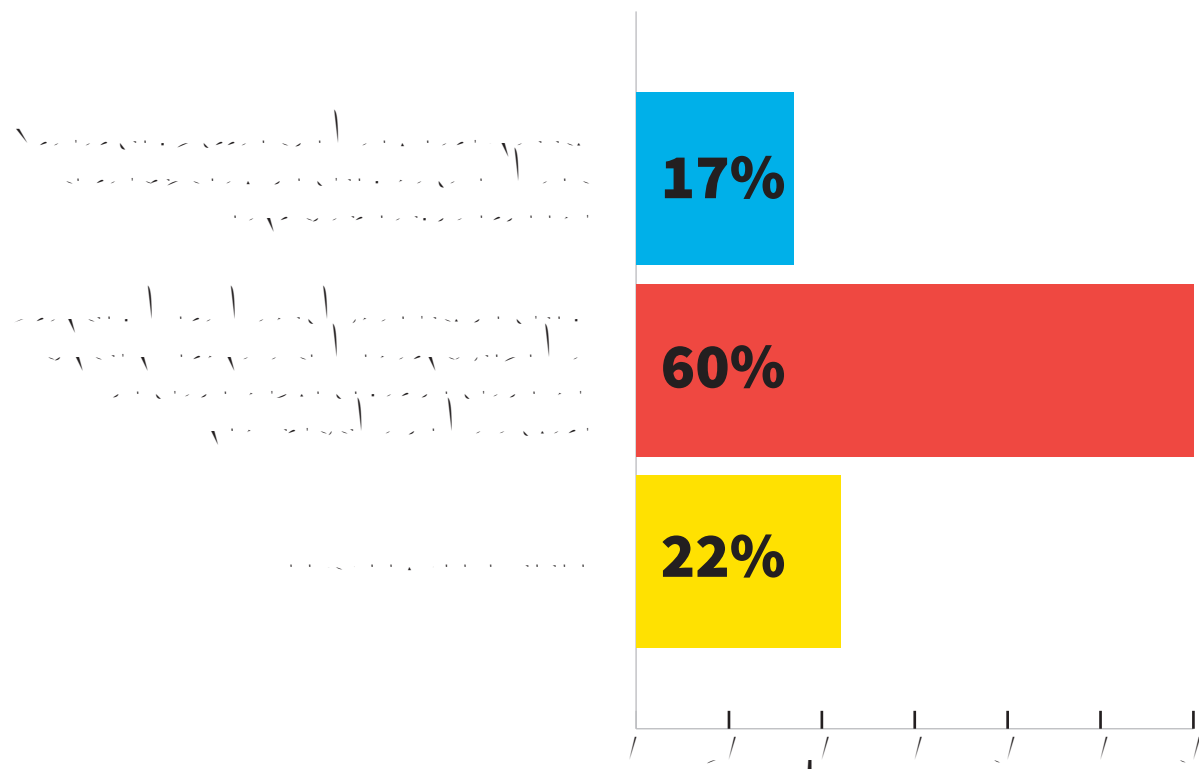
Housing Affordability Must Be Addressed Locally and Nationally

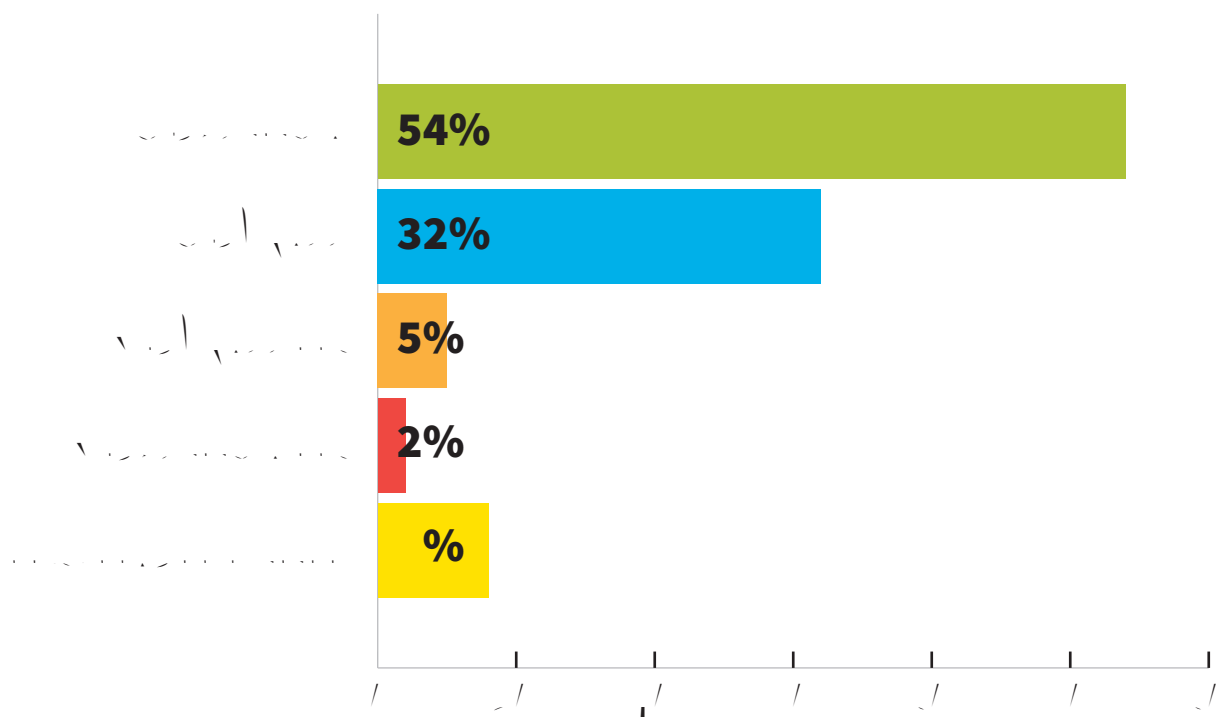

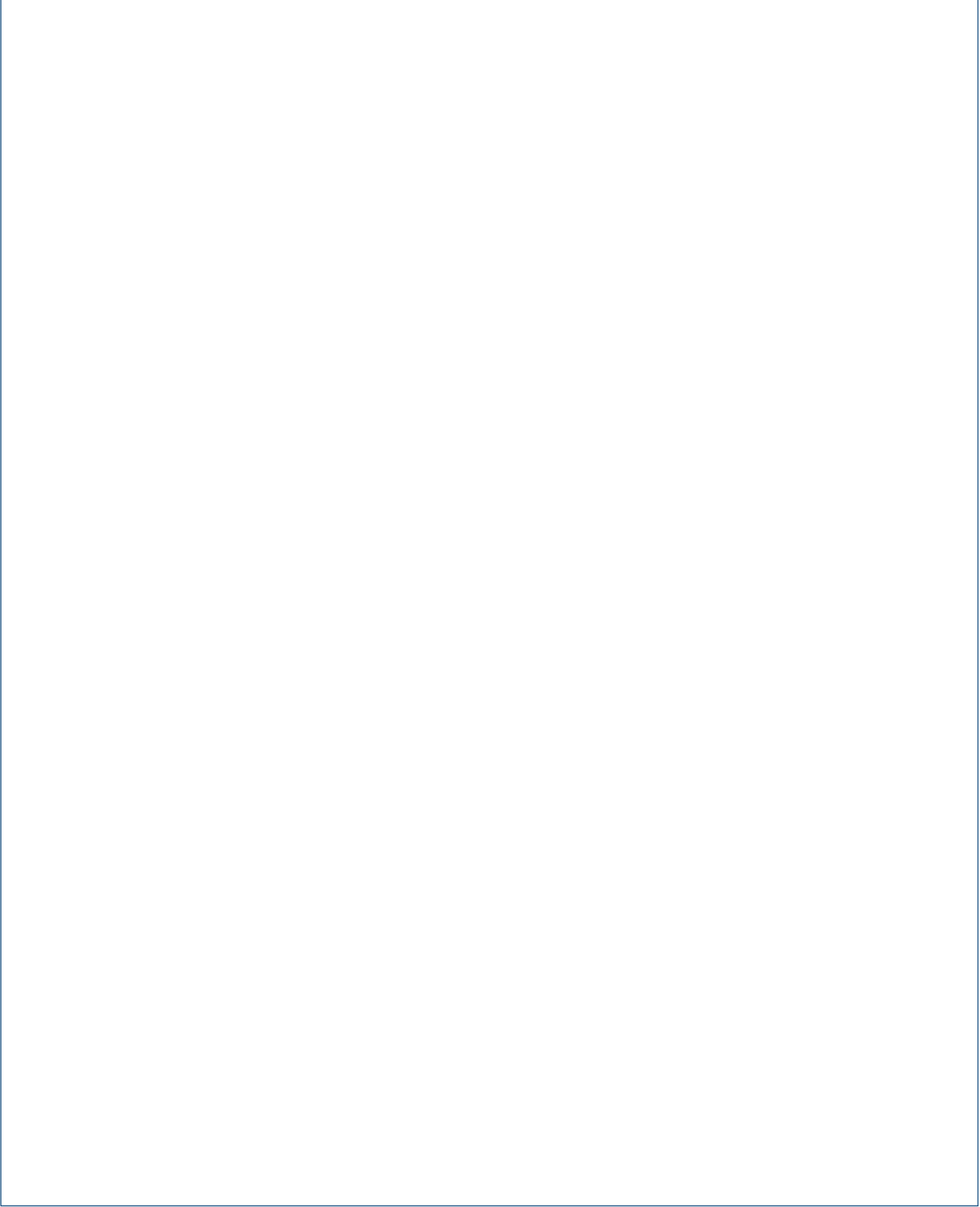
